Getting Ready for

Flu Season

As part of our effort to bring health education and prevention screenings to Rhode Island's most vulnerable populations, we coordinate and underwrite the Community Flu Vaccination Program each year. Through this initiative, we partner with both the Health & Wellness Institute and the Wellness Company to provide free seasonal flu shots to communities throughout the state. Our primary focus is to reach the uninsured and underinsured, and we do this by targeting local social service organizations that serve a high number of people who are unemployed, poor, and who are likely to be uninsured.

This year, we will be hosting seasonal flu clinics at nearly 40 organizations, including AIDS Care Ocean State, Big Sisters of Rhode Island, Crossroads Rhode Island, and McAuley House, just to name a few. Through last year's program, we provided more than 600 flu shots to Rhode Islanders who participated in our community clinics, including more than 200 who were uninsured—and we hope to increase our reach in 2009.

BCBSRI Supports New Physician Network

The Rhode Island Free Clinic (RIFC) was founded specifically and exclusively to address the healthcare needs of the uninsured. It is estimated that one in 10 Rhode Islanders are currently without health insurance, or nearly 130,000 people. Through a key initiative recently launched called the Physician Network, the Free Clinic intends to vastly expand its reach and effectiveness in caring for the uninsured.

The Physician Network started in late 2008, and now includes 65 primary care physicians and 25 specialists in 13 communities across the state. The network

allows physicians to see patients in their own offices, which makes it more convenient for doctors to volunteer and patients to seek care. Patients are then referred to specialists and diagnostic labs already in the RIFC network who are also volunteering their expertise and services. The RIFC has also recently opened an office in Newport, further expanding its reach.

In July, the Free Clinic hosted "Picnic in the Parking Lot," where it recognized BCBSRI and the Rhode Island physicians who helped launch its Physician Network. With a \$50,000 contribution from BCBSRI dedicated to supporting the Physician Network, the RIFC will be able to increase its Physician Network by 100 percent this year, doubling the number of patient visits to 4,000. At the event, BCBSRI's Dr. Gus Manocchia, Vice President and Chief Medical Officer and RIFC volunteer physician, said, "It is our mission to ensure that every Rhode Islander receives quality healthcare, especially during these difficult economic times. We are proud to support the RIFC's goal to increase the number of physicians that participate in the Physician Network and help increase access to healthcare within the community."

Primary Care Initiative Receives Major Funding from BCBSRI

We are pleased to announce that we recently joined a coalition of local institutions, which includes The Rhode Island Foundation and the Rhode Island Medical Society. to create a \$700,000 loan forgiveness pool for primary care physicians (PCPs). The first of its kind in Rhode Island, the goal of the PCP Loan Forgiveness Program is to address the state's growing PCP shortage. "We're delighted that Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Rhode Island has contributed \$500,000 to our existing pool of \$200,000, becoming our first funding partner in this important new venture," says Neil Steinberg, Rhode Island Foundation President and CEO.

James E. Purcell, President and CEO at BCBSRI, expressed his enthusiasm for this effort to increase the number of primary care physicians in our community. "We must take dramatic steps to promote the vital role that primary care physicians play in providing high-quality healthcare, as well as increase the number of primary care physicians in Rhode Island. Our support for the loan forgiveness program is just the

latest example of our ongoing commitment to achieving these goals."

Nationally and locally there is a shortage of PCPs. A recent report issued by the American College of Physicians noted that, "Primary care, the backbone of the nation's healthcare system, is at grave risk of collapse." A 2008 study by the Journal of the American Medical Association found that only 2 percent of students graduating from medical school plan to practice primary care. It is predicted that the United States will need 40 percent more PCPs by 2020. Currently, 66,000 Rhode Islanders are without PCPs.

The PCP Loan Forgiveness Program will eventually serve doctors, nurses, nurse practitioners, physicians' assistants, social workers, and perhaps dentists and dental hygienists. The Rhode Island Student Loan Association will serve as administrator of the program. Applications will be available September 15, 2009 at risla.com.



Employee Resource Group Takes Shape

As we move BCBSRI's diversity initiative forward, we are pleased to announce the formation of our company-sponsored Employee Resource Group (ERG). The ERG Planning Committee was pleased to host two introductory sessions in June 2009. During the sessions, participants were asked to fill out a "Gaining Perspective" questionnaire to gauge preferences on a variety of questions related to forming the group, including topics of interest, ERG goals, and logistical details. Some of the issues that the ERG may address include: celebrating and leveraging diversity throughout the company, community outreach to various minority groups, opportunities for personal and professional growth, and increasing cultural competency. As a result of the ERG sessions, 25 employees volunteered to become members.

The Social Mission Committee is chaired by Juana I. Horton, President and CEO of Horton Interpreting Services, Inc., and also includes The Honorable Edward C. Clifton, Thomas L. Falcone, and John P. Maguire. The committee meets twice a year.
